



Current Conditions

Zone	Potential Metrics	Rating
Commercial Insurance	High property insurance rates; healthier property insurance market; competitive worker' compensation rates; competitive unemployment insurance rates	
Taxes	Competitive state tax environment though significant variation at local level	
Regulation	Minimum wage exceeds US average but annual increases are modest; recent reductions in regulations	
Permitting	Permitting can be a significant obstacle for many businesses; land use laws vary considerable within state	
Property Rights	Florida generally has strong protections for private property owners	
Legal Reform	Florida ranks poorly across most measures of legal fairness, including treatment of class action lawsuits, damages, discovery, and impartiality	
Workplace Issues	Significant number of occupations require a license; number of right to work states continues to decline

How Do We Get There? Examples.

Taxes

- Balance burden of taxation between businesses and individuals
- Regulation/Permitting
 - Streamline permitting processes and <u>clarify</u> requirements on businesses
- Insurance
 - Ensure <u>stability</u> of property insurance markets
- Workplace Mandates
 - Simplify, clarify, and <u>reduce</u> occupational licensing requirements
- Legal Reform
 - Reduce Assignment of Benefits abuse
- Property Rights
 - Remain <u>responsive</u> to changes in broader legal environment



How Will We Get There?

- What key issues need attention?
- What major risks do we face?
- What should we keep doing?
- What should we be doing differently?



Shared Perspectives

- Start with the end in mind and work your way back.
- Don't let the business climate go bad and then try to fix it

 that's too hard and rarely works.
- A concern is having a disruptive political environment, which can damage growth opportunities.
- Disruption isn't necessarily a bad thing—it also creates new opportunities.



Strategic Themes

- Ensuring property, people, and workers are adequately and efficiently insured and protected from risks
- Ensuring land use policies, regulations, and legal system are modernized and fair to produce a low cost business climate for businesses and workers
- Defining the state's role with new technologies and industries: regulation or facilitation? or, adoption and promotion?



Strategic Themes

- "Right-sizing" revenue sources to support a competitive economy (balance between consumers and businesses, goods and services, growth and stagnation)
- Ensuring sufficient funding for necessary investments—a low cost environment alone is insufficient to sustain growth.
- Maintaining a pro-business climate, regardless of broader political environment.
