

Industry Diversification by MSA












Growth to 2030 by Age Group






Total Voter Registration in Florida



Why was Most Polling wrong in 2018?


- Most polling modeled NPA's higher than they have ever been in an election in Florida. One poll even had NPA above 30%
- Other polls modeled Democratic turnout closer to registration than how they usually perform in midterm elections (R+2 is the norm)

Election Day 😑 Early Vote






TOTAL VOTER REGISTRATION By County (39R, 28D)




