





Florida's Economy At A Glance


- Florida's Economy \$1.1 Trillion GDP (17th)

Ending Generational Poverty


870,505 kids under-18 living in poverty

Florida 2030 Goal: Less than 10% of Florida children live in poverty and 100% have a pathway out


- Florida has 983 zip codes
- Half of all children in poverty live in just 15% of Florida's zip codes (150)



Fiscal Cliffs Are Roadblocks to Prosperity















Can Florida's 3rd Graders Read?




By County (39R, 28D)
