




# 188 Nations/Territories – 14 Million Annual Visitors











RE: Safely Restarting Florida's Economy

#### Dear Governor DeSantis,

Florida's business community is grateful for your leadership during this difficult time. Throughout this crisis you've been deliberate and provided meaningful and thoughtful guidance to Florida's business community, including emphasizing the safety of all Floridians while not totally shutting down the world's 17<sup>th</sup> largest economy. On behalf of the Florida Chamber's Board of Directors, we say thank you for your steady hand and measured approach. I know you share our goal that when the COVID-19 global pandemic is successfully brought to an end, others will look back from around the world and once again have reason to say Florida got it right and continues to be a model worth following.

Now that your Re-Open Florida Task Force and the various Industry Working Groups have met and concluded their initial work, and your request for public input was extended Saturday morning, I am writing to share some thoughts based on input we're getting from businesses of all sizes from all regions of Florida.

It appears Florida is successfully flattening the curve. As we pivot to a plan to reopen and restart Florida's economy, it's imperative that we continue with a deliberate approach that mitigates the possibility of a Singapore-like resurgence in coronavirus cases which could lead to a second partial shutdown of our economy and needlessly risk the public health and safety of more Floridians. Therefore, Florida's re-opening should be based on a phased-in approach based on clear metrics.

As you know, Governor, the Florida Chamber has engaged some of the brightest minds to provide recommendations on how to successfully restart our state. We have also been in constant contact with business leaders, local chambers, economic development organizations, our business association partners, national peer groups such as a joint task force with the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, among others. I also have the honor of being the national chair of the Council of State Chambers this year, and will have the advantage of learning from the real time successes and missteps of other states' efforts to reopen their economies.

The primary goal for a re-opening strategy will be balancing containment of COVID-19 while prioritizing a safe return to work. In addition, we want to ensure our healthcare institutions are able to treat patients and have the necessary Personal Protection Equipment (PPE) for their own safety. Our healthcare heroes have been relentless and their continued safety should remain a top priority. Furthermore, the maintenance of public confidence in their own safety must remain paramount as these decisions are implemented.

As Florida re-opens our economy and allows individuals to return to work, certain measures should be put in place to protect Floridians. While there is no playbook for this unprecedented crisis, what we can do is follow the data. What the data is telling us so far is each community has its own unique set of circumstances and a restart should: consider the level of the local threat and availability of healthcare resources; create special considerations for small business; include a community assessment of local resources as well as a single, clear and implementable set of safety guidelines employers should follow ide:

#### Key Recommendations

1- We suggest that local, state and federal agencies coordinate so that employers have clear, concise and consistent guidelines.

2- Liability protections must be considered for all frontline and essential (and non-essential) businesses who have provided a continuity of service throughout this crisis.

3- Small businesses need special considerations

4- Childcare and transportation for essential workers should be a priority.

5- Certainty and consistency in the application of any rules around reopening should be prioritized to the greatest extent possible...State guidance should supersede local guidance to maximize clarity.

# OPENING UP AMERICA AGAIN





#### BASED ON UP-TO-DATE DATA AND READINESS

Proposed Phased Approach

MITIGATES RISK OF RESURGENCE

**PROTECTS** THE MOST VULNERABLE

IMPLEMENTABLE ON **STATEWIDE OR COUNTY-BY-COUNTY** BASIS AT GOVERNORS' DISCRETION



### **Proposed State or Regional Gating Criteria**

(Satisfy Before Proceeding to Phased Opening)

#### SYMPTOMS

Downward trajectory of influenza-like illnesses (ILI) reported within a 14-day period

Downward trajectory of covid-like syndromic cases reported within a 14-day period

#### CASES

Downward trajectory of documented cases within a 14-day period

#### OR

Downward trajectory of positive tests as a percent of total tests within a 14-day period (flat or increasing volume of tests)

#### HOSPITALS

Treat all patients without crisis care

AND

Robust testing program in place for at-risk healthcare workers, including emerging antibody testing

\*State and local officials may need to tailor the application of these criteria to local circumstances (e.g., metropolitan areas that have suffered severe COVID outbreaks, rural and suburban areas where outbreaks have not occurred or have been mild). Additionally, where appropriate, Governors should work on a regional basis to satisfy these criteria and to progress through the phases outlined below.

#### **Guidelines for All Phases: Employers**

#### Develop and implement appropriate policies, in accordance with Federal, State, and local regulations and guidance, and informed by industry best practices, regarding:

- ✓ Social distancing and protective equipment
- ✓ Temperature checks
- ✓ Testing, isolating, and contact tracing
- ✓ Sanitation
- ✓ Use and disinfection of common and high-traffic areas
- ✓ Business travel

Monitor workforce for indicative symptoms. Do not allow symptomatic people to physically return to work until cleared by a medical provider.

Develop and implement policies and procedures for workforce contact tracing following employee COVID+ test.



### Phase One SPECIFIC TYPES OF EMPLOYERS

**SCHOOLS AND ORGANIZED YOUTH ACTIVITIES** (e.g., daycare, camp) that are currently closed should remain closed.

**VISITS TO SENIOR LIVING FACILITIES AND HOSPITALS** should be prohibited. Those who do interact with residents and patients must adhere to strict protocols regarding hygiene.

**LARGE VENUES** (e.g., sit-down dining, movie theaters, sporting venues, places of worship) can operate under strict physical distancing protocols.

**ELECTIVE SURGERIES** can resume, as clinically appropriate, on an outpatient basis at facilities that adhere to CMS guidelines.

**GYMS** can open if they adhere to strict physical distancing and sanitation protocols.

BARS should remain closed.



# **Phase Two**

FOR STATES AND REGIONS WITH NO EVIDENCE OF A REBOUND AND THAT SATISFY THE GATING CRITERIA A SECOND TIME

# Phase Two

SPECIFIC TYPES OF EMPLOYERS SCHOOLS AND ORGANIZED YOUTH ACTIVITIES (e.g., daycare, camp) can reopen.

VISITS TO SENIOR CARE FACILITIES AND HOSPITALS should be prohibited. Those who do interact with residents and patients must adhere to strict protocols regarding hygiene.

**LARGE VENUES** (e.g., sit-down dining, movie theaters, sporting venues, places of worship) can operate under moderate physical distancing protocols.

**ELECTIVE SURGERIES** can resume, as clinically appropriate, on an outpatient and in-patient basis at facilities that adhere to CMS guidelines.

**GYMS** can remain open if they adhere to strict physical distancing and sanitation protocols.

**BARS** may operate with diminished standing-room occupancy, where applicable and appropriate.

EACH PHASE OF THIS GUIDANCE ADDRESSES THOSE ASPECTS OF DAILY LIFE FOR WHICH RESTRICTIONS REMAIN APPROPRIATE DUE TO COVID.






