On September 10th, 2017, the Florida Keys was struck by one of the most devastating hurricanes in history. Hurricane Irma brought Category 4 winds as strong as 130 mph and a storm surge as high as 12 feet. No part of the Keys was spared. Thousands of residents were affected by the destruction and damage to homes and property, cars, boats, businesses and work places.

Within days of Hurricane Irma's strike on the Keys, the Community Foundation activated the Florida Keys Emergency Relief Fund and mobilized efforts to raise and distribute critical funding for emergency needs and recovery. Within three weeks, relief grants were distributed. By the end of the year, \$1,016,900 was disbursed through 74 nonprofit partners, greatly benefiting thousands of residents from Key West to Key Largo. Vital aid went directly to the dire residents who needed it most—children and families, people who lost their homes, teachers, police officers, workers in the depleted tourism industry, fishermen, artists, special needs populations and more.

Thousands of individuals, businesses and foundations across the country and as far away as New Zealand contributed to CFFK's disaster relief initiative through generous donations to the Florida Keys Emergency Relief Fund and the Landau Family Hurricane Relief Fund for the Upper Keys.

100% of all contributions went directly to community needs, thanks in part to the Dogwood Foundation who made a grant to underwrite a portion of the costs to administer this enormous initiative. And our efforts are not over yet as our community continues to recover and rebuild.



Members of the Upper Keys Advisory Committee, one of four community groups representing all areas of the Keys formed to assist CFFK with grant review, presented checks for recovery to the nonprofit recipients from Islamorada and Key Largo.
