


Tampa Bay MSA: Hillsborough, Pinellas, Pasco and Hernando Q3 2018 data













Florida's 3rd Grade Reading Scores













2018 Voter Turnout By Party




Why was Most Polling wrong in 2018?

- Most polling modeled NPA's higher than they have ever been in an election in Florida. One poll even had NPA above 30%
- Other polls modeled Democratic turnout closer to registration than how they usually perform in midterm elections (R+2 is the norm)



2018 Voter Turnout By County






Florida's Electoral Changes and Forecast




Vote Share by Ballot Method






Total Voter Registration

By County (41R, 26D)






MARCH NEW VOTERS By County




