## Job Creation by State: 2014-2018







U.S. Growth Rate: 10.1%









DeSantis approves Florida toll road projects, overcoming environmental concerns

Galvano was sold on the idea for the roads from the Florida Chamber of Commerce and road builders, which were by far the biggest supporters of the bill.





- Citizenship Requirement to Vote in Florida



#### Why was Most Polling wrong in 2018?


- Most polling modeled NPA's higher than they have ever been in an election in Florida. One poll even had NPA above 30%
- Other polls modeled Democratic turnout closer to registration than how they usually perform in midterm elections (R+2 is the norm)




#### Vote Share by Ballot Method








