More Frivolous Lawsuits... You Know They're Coming

May 20, 2020

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS:

The undersigned chambers of commerce urge Congress to pass timely, temporary and targeted liability relief legislation to provide businesses a safe harbor from unwarranted lawsuits that, left unchecked, will endanger the fight against the pandemic and undermine the safe and orderly return to work for millions of Americans.

From distillers who switched to producing hand sanitizers, to manufacturers that transformed their operations to construct personal protective equipment (PPE) and ventilators, to front line medical professionals treating the afflicted, to pharmaceutical companies that are expediting research into cures, American businesses have rallied to fight the pandemic. During the stay-at-home orders, essential businesses have remained open and innovated in ways that permitted them to continue to provide critical services and supplies. Now millions of other businesses are in the process of reopening, desiring to do so in a safe manner that protects their employees and customers.

This is an unprecedented situation and despite employers' best efforts to comply with public health guidance, many are concerned that they will be forced to defend themselves against a wave of lawsuits. Their concern is driven by the fact that each day brings news of more lawsuits that have already been filed. That is why Congress should provide a safe harbor that holds truly bad actors accountable, but that protects those employers who are working to follow public health guidance. Specifically, temporary protections should remain in place for the duration of the pandemic crisis and response that cover:

- Businesses that work to follow government guidelines against COVID-19 exposure claims.
- Healthcare providers and facilities on the front lines of the COVID-19 response.
- Manufacturers that repurposed production and distribution to provide PPE, sanitizers, and other needed countermeasures.
- Companies that have donated their stock of supplies to hospitals and medical professionals.
- Public companies that could face securities lawsuits, including those driven largely on stock price drops resulting from the global pandemic under the spurious assertion that management failed to warn investors.

To ensure that we continue to wage war against the pandemic while also safely returning Americans to work, Congress must act without delay.

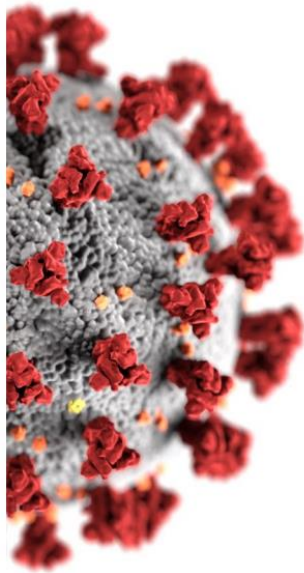

Practices

COVID-19 testing is essential. CDC is working within the "All-of-us" strategy to increase testing capacity and availability to improve case counts of the US plan to Opening Up America Again. As the supply and demand have broadened to include a wider range of people and situations.

Encourage the US government to support diverse efforts to increase testing, surveillance, and outbreak control:

Management: CDC is working with federal government partners to support laboratories, clinics, and public health departments to ensure the capability to meet demand and a turnaround time needed for appropriate clinical care and public health response.

Encourage management partners to provide a wide range of technical assistance to help them develop a state-specific testing plan that meets their needs.

Encourage laboratories with sufficient quantities of devices, reagents, and analytical reagent resource (IRR). Encourage the Coronavirus Task Force to enhance the national supply of devices so that the commercial market is able to supply state efforts. This includes ensuring that the commercial market is able to supply state efforts. This includes ensuring that the commercial market is able to supply state efforts.

Control: Identify newly emergent cases or clusters of COVID-19 in asymptomatic and pre-symptomatic individuals. Encourage the use of COVID-19 cases to public health systems. CDC is working with state and territorial surveillance systems to identify any areas of potential COVID-19 activity. Encourage the use of CDC's Influenza-Like Illness Network and the National Syndromic Surveillance Network.

Encourage state, local, territorial, and tribal levels to develop a robust testing strategy, particularly among vulnerable populations such as people of racial and ethnic minority groups (e.g., African Americans, Alaska Natives) at higher risk of disease, and those in areas of congregate settings, and congregate housing.

Encourage surveillance efforts for identifying infections through routine testing and contact tracing efforts through increased public health staff.

Encourage diagnostic test manufacturers and state health departments to work with rapid, point-of-care devices and encourage the use of assays for use in surveillance and for potential use for returning to normal.

Encourage local, and other partners to define the circumstances where testing is needed in controlling the pandemic, as well as the best application of resources.

Transitions between phases should also consider the public health capacity of the jurisdiction based on local data. Other epidemiologic data sources available locally can be used to corroborate trends and inform decision-making. Special consideration should be given to infections identified in settings such as healthcare personnel, patients in healthcare facilities (e.g., nursing homes, term care facilities), and residents of congregate living settings (e.g., prisons, youth residential facilities, and people of racial and ethnic minority groups (e.g., African Americans, Alaska Natives) at higher risk of disease. Incidence and trajectory (increasing COVID-19 illnesses in the surrounding region should also be considered.

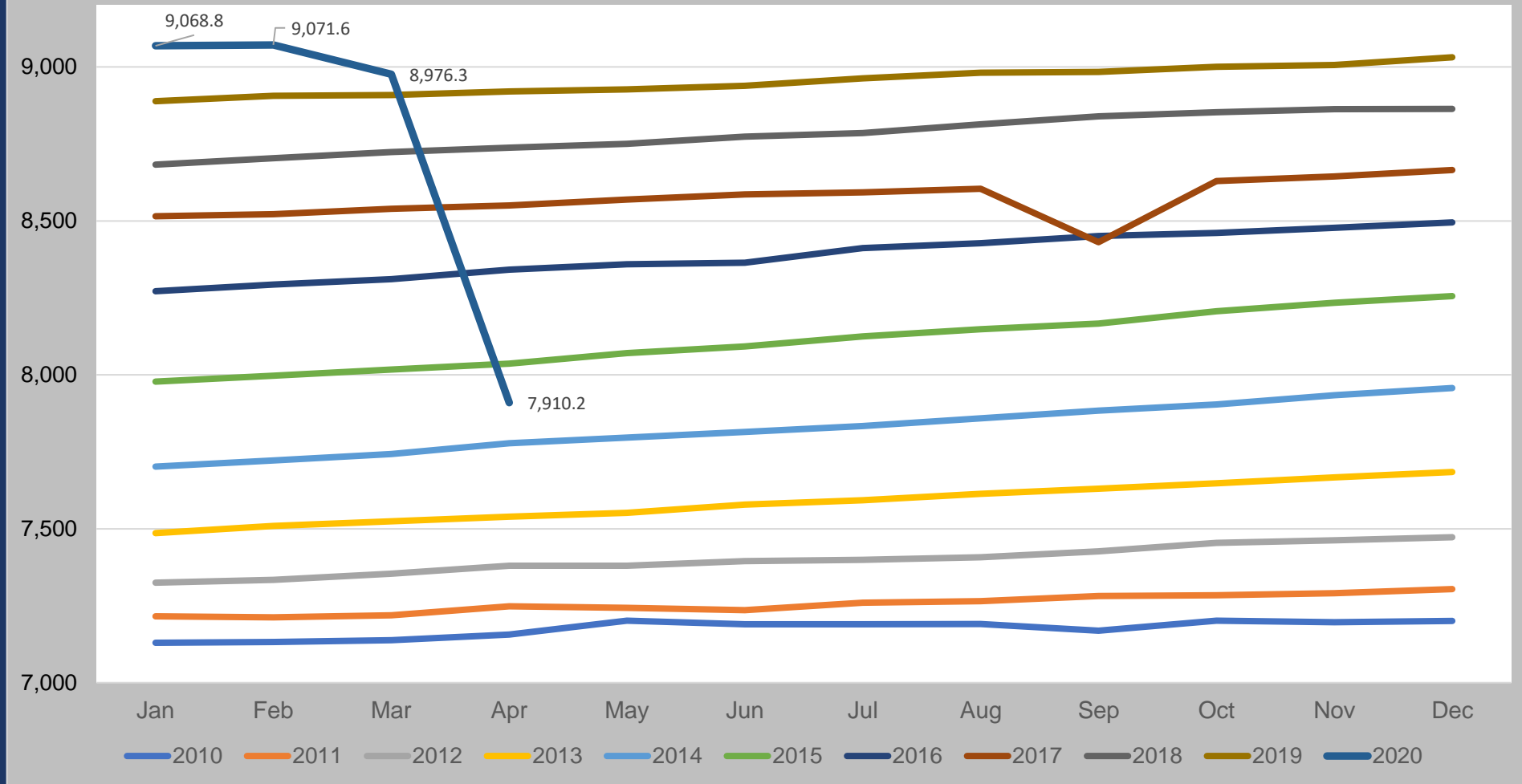

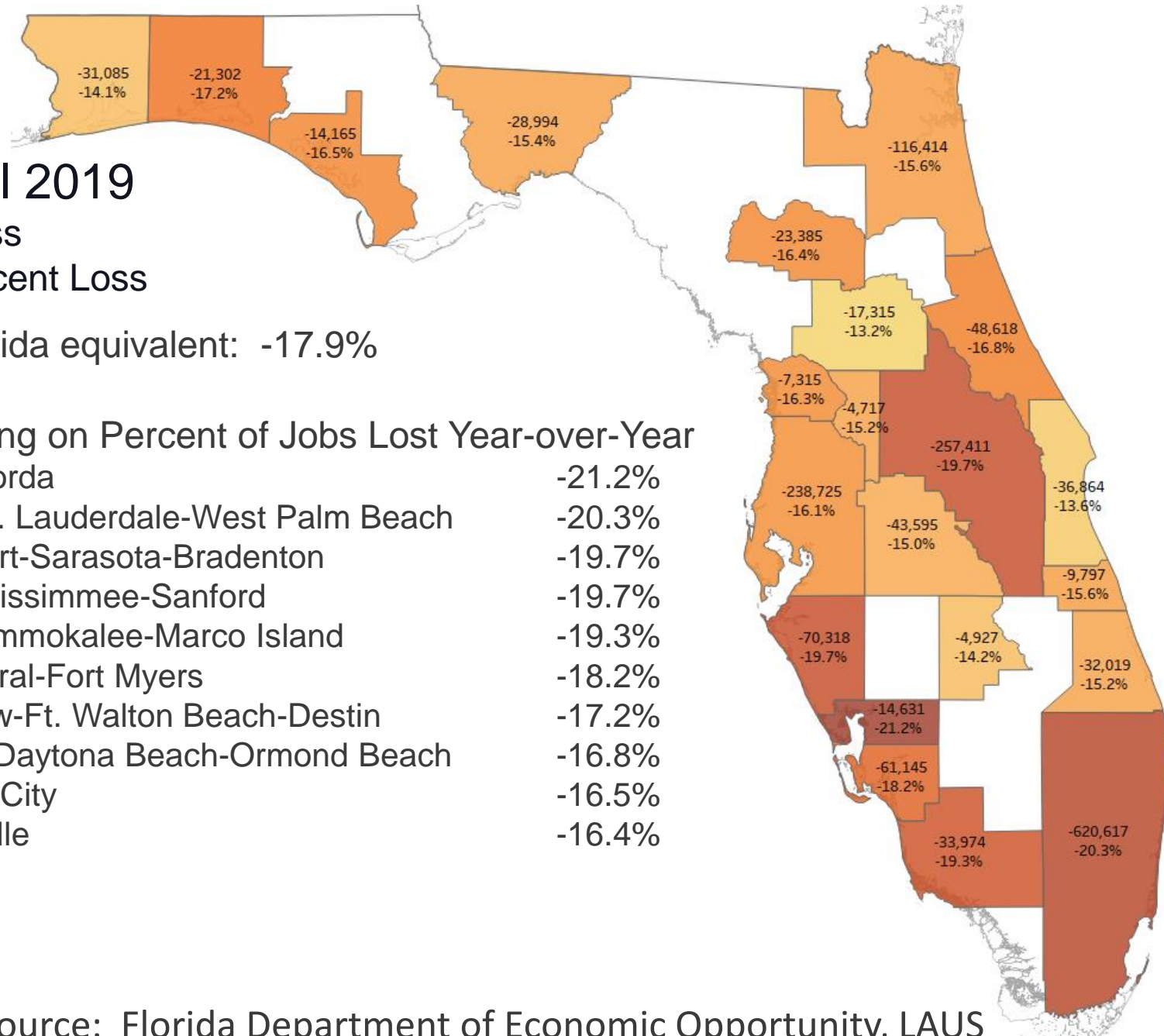

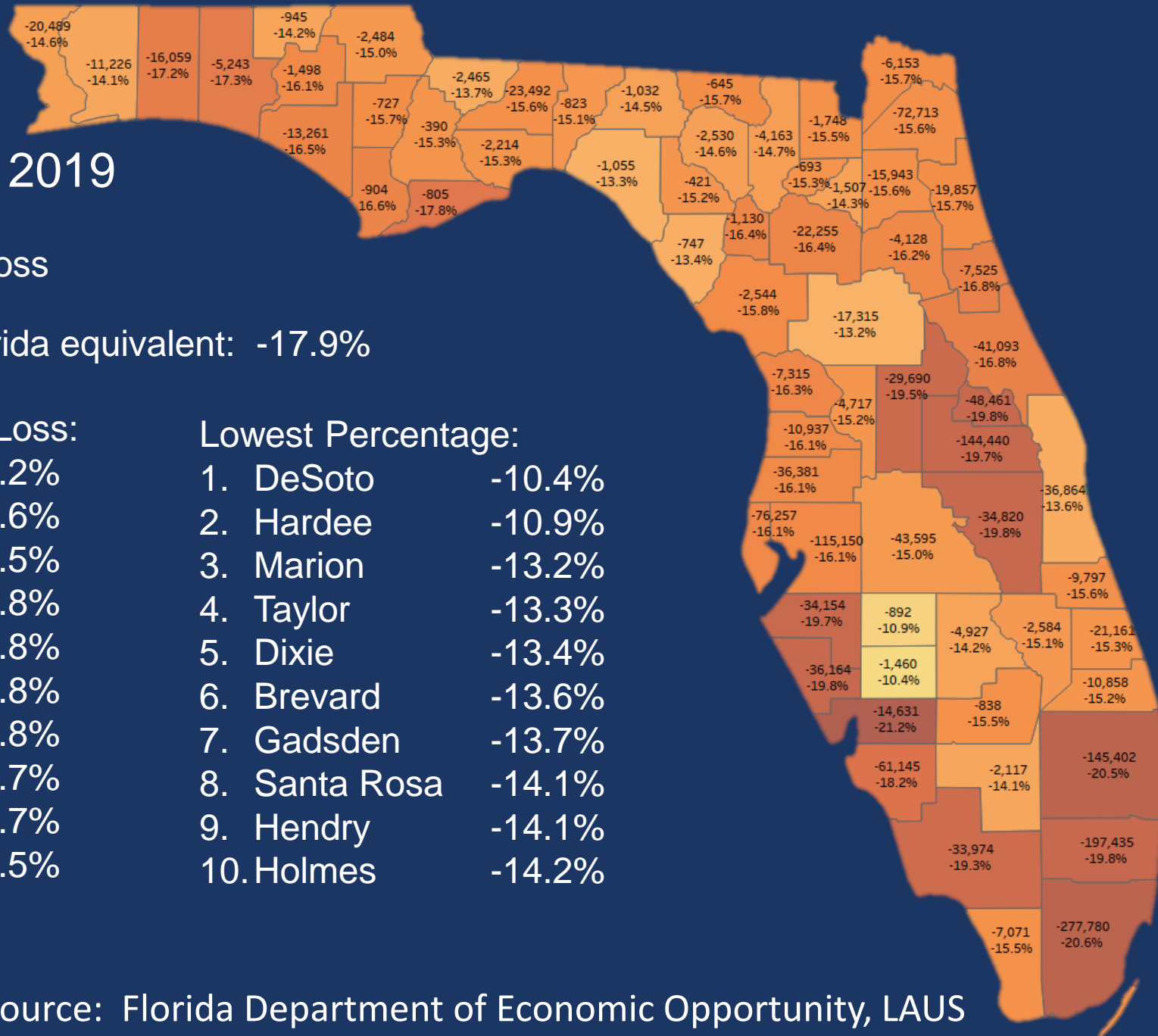
