



#### **How Does Early Learning Impact a Child's Future?**

Children Who Receive Quality Adult Interaction and Early Learning in Their First Years Are:

- •50% less likely to need special education
- •70% less likely to be arrested for a violent crime
- •50% less likely to become teen parents

Approximately, 50% of children that grow up in low-income households are already behind by the time they reach Kindergarten.






#### **Developmental Milestones**





# **Early Learning Population**

- 1.3 million children younger than 6<sup>1</sup>
- 42% percent of those are from low-income families<sup>1</sup>
  - Of the 42%, 27% participated in the SR Program<sup>2</sup>
  - 221,715 children are enrolled in Fiscal Year 2019-20<sup>3</sup>
- 71% of Florida's 4-year-olds participated in the VPK Program<sup>4</sup>
  - 166,726 children enrolled in Program Year 2019-20

## **CARES Act Funding**

#### **Successful Transition to Kindergarten**

Rising Kindergarten Program - \$10,915,461 CARES

- Funding to 37 school districts via coalitions
- Provide an emphasis on closing/remediating achievement gaps.
- Minimize potential learning loss due to program closures this spring.
- Set students up for success.
- Help students acclimate to kindergarten.
- Provide a jump start to the kindergarten concepts and skills.
- Provide instruction to fill any early literacy achievement gaps for children in need.





## **CARES Act Funding**

#### **VPK Progress Monitoring Pilot Program**

#### Overview

- Provide opportunity for VPK providers to implement Star Early Literacy in their VPK programs in the 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 school years.
- Provide a more comprehensive overview of the learning and growth continuum during critical early learning years.
- Funded through Child Care Development Fund/CARES (\$2.9M).
- Voluntary participation available on an application basis.
- Approved 1,578 VPK providers with almost 49,000 VPK students.



#### **2019 Kindergarten Readiness by County**











#### VPK Program Participation Rate 2006-2007 to 2025-2026\*





#### **VPK Provider Readiness Rates**

- Beginning with the 2018-2019 VPK Provider Kindergarten Readiness Rates, the final readiness rates consist of a combination of the percentage of children ready on FLKRS and the learning gains shown by children on the Florida VPK assessment.
- 67% of the 2018-19 VPK programs met or exceeded the minimum readiness rate of 60.
- Inclusion of learning gains for the first time added as much as 10 points to each program's rate.



# **Funding SR Programs and Improving Quality**

- \$895,877,228 Total Funding
  - \$689,927,228 Allocation to Coalitions
  - \$ 60,000,000 Fund Waitlist
  - \$ 50,000,000 Provider Rate Increases
  - \$ 40,000,000 QPI/Differentials
  - \$ 30,000,000 Match Program
- Raised minimum program assessment score required for contracting for SR services
- Incentives for higher CLASS scores and child assessments – up to 15%





# **Meaning of CLASS Scores**



#### What Does a CLASS® Score Mean for My Child's Early Learning Experience?

Florida's School Readiness providers are measured on the effectiveness of teacher-child interactions that drive a child's learning outcomes. The Office of Early Learning requires trained, certified observers to use the Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS®) to assess interactions that lead to higher-quality teaching practices. These assessment scores can help you choose a quality child care program. CLASS® assessments vary by age level and include the following areas of interactions:

Toddler

Infant (Birth-18 months)

(19-35 months)

Pre-Kindergarten (36 months-5 years)

Support

Responsive Caregiving

Emotional and Behavioral Support Emotional Support

Engaged Support for Learning

Classroom Organization Instructional

#### Provider CLASS® scores are created by averaging observation scores from their classrooms.

CLASS® Score 1 to 2  Providers with these scores are not eligible to participate in the School Readiness Program.	CLASS® Score 3 to 5  Provider must have a score of 3.5 or higher to participate in the School Readiness Program.	CLASS® Score 5 to 7
Reflects ineffective teaching practices demonstrated by few, if any, displays of effective teaching behaviors described in the high range. For example, in the low range, teachers routinely ignore or dismiss children's needs or feelings; rarely engage children in meaningful activities or conversation; rarely smile or make eye contact; and, rarely provide children with choices.	Reflects a mix of teaching practices, demonstrated by teachers displaying the behaviors described in the high range some of the time, but at other times only providing basic supervision. For example, in the middle range, the daily routine may be followed on some days but not others; teachers may talk to children and ask questions about their play on some days, but just sit nearby and watch on other days; and, teachers may respond promptly to children's needs at some times, but at other times simply ignore or dismiss the child.	Reflects good teaching practices demonstrated by a clear lack of negativity in the classroom and frequent displays of effective teaching behaviors such as eye contact, smiling, friendly interactions, sensitivity to children's needs and feelings, providing opportunities for choice and leadership, consistent rules and routines, engaging children in meaningful activities and conversation and positive behavior support.









# **Meaning of CLASS Scores**

What are some of the teacher-child interactions that CLASS® measures?

The teacher:

- Establishes warm, supportive relationships between and with children.
- Follows the child's lead and interest during play.
- Helps children understand expectations and effectively redirects misbehavior.
- Acknowledges accomplishments and efforts.
- Uses discussions and activities to promote higher-order thinking skills.
- Stimulates language and vocabulary development.

How do I find the score for my provider or a provider I am considering for my child?

You can find if a provider has a CLASS® score through the Florida Department of Children and Families' Child Care Search (CARES) website at <a href="https://cares.myflfamilies.com/PublicSearch">https://cares.myflfamilies.com/PublicSearch</a>. You will see a score displayed like the one below:



If my provider does not have a CLASS® score, does it mean they do not provide quality care and education?

No, it means the rules may not require them to have an assessment because they:

- Serve only school-age children.
- Have a low number of School Readiness children.
- Provide only overnight School Readiness services.

# **Preschool Development Grant**

- Three-year grant period began January 1, 2020 for \$40.2 million total (\$13.4 million/year).
  - o Improving **program quality**.
  - Expanding access to targeted professional development.
  - Facilitating better partnerships between programs.
  - Improving transitions from ECE programs into elementary school.
  - Increasing program operating and cost efficiencies.
  - Expanding parental choices and involvement.
  - Ensuring families are linked to the full range of services they need.







## **Selected Initiatives**

- Promoting high-quality early literacy training opportunities
- Upskilling our SR instructors in targeted areas
- Aligning instructor/teacher competencies – prek-grade 3
- Schools of Hope/Contracted Slots for Child Care Deserts
- Renewing our focus on social emotional and early literacy supports for birth – 3








