




Does your Chamber support the Florida Chamber's efforts for to provide COVID-19 liability protection to businesses that have made efforts to follow state and federal health guidelines?



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








Florida Registration (2020 general election bookclosing)








## Florida Voter Turnout

77.2% of all registered voters in Florida cast ballots in the 2020 general election.







# Record Voter Participation in Florida





Votes Cast by Method, 2020 General Election






# **Voting Methods Become Polarized by Party**




### **New Floridians Drive Record Turnout**

Nearly one-fifth of Vote-by-Mail and Early votes cast in the 2020 general election came from new voters













# **Election Results**

Counties where local chamber publicly opposed A2, the Amendment performed 4% worse than statewide.

- •Amendment 2 narrowly passed the 60% statewide threshold required for passage despite failing to hit 60% in 57 of Florida's 67 counties.
- •In a majority of Florida counties (35 of 67), Amendment 2 failed to earn the support of even 50% of voters.





# Implementation

Florida Chamber stood up a website to help guide employers on implementation

Amendment 2 passed on election night by a narrow margin to increase Florida's minimum wage gradually to \$15 an hour. RE: Chambers of Commerce Urge Your Support for 501(c)(6) Organizations in Continuing Small Business Recovery and Paycheck Protection Program Act

Dear Members of Florida's Congressional Delegation:

As leaders of Florida's business community, the Florida Chamber of Commerce and the undersigned local chambers of commerce thank you for the actions you've taken to help Florida's job creators keep as many workers employed as possible, while also working to ensure they don't go under during this time of crisis resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic.

As efforts to reach consensus on the next round of COVID-19 relief face the looming deadline of congressional adjournment for the holidays, we encourage you to support the broad-based eligibility of 501(c)(6) organizations under the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) and ensure that it is included in any final futher COVID-19 legislation. 501(c)(6) organizations, which include chambers of commerce and other organizations that serve your local businesses, are included under both the current Senate and House proposals. We appreciate the leadership Senator Marco Rubio and Representative Greg Steube have demonstrated in putting forth legislation on 501(c)(6) inclusion that has garnered bipartisan support from both chambers. Support for your local chambers of commerce has been an example of the Florida delegation's bipartisan leadership in action.

The continued inclusion of these organizations' eligibility in the PPP program in any final negotiated legislation will not only allow us to protect jobs internally, but help protect the jobs created by the businesses we serve. This is important because:

- Trade associations and economic development organizations are essential services and needed to weather this economic storm so we can help our members stay in business and provide services to your constituents;
- Not-for-profit businesses of all sizes are seeking to improve their liquidity, so they can support their employees, and delay or suspend the remittance of all payroll taxes;
- Expanding and streamlining loan programs for as many businesses as possible
  experiencing revenue loss as a result of COVID-19 will allow those businesses to convert
  the loans to grants to the extent that they use the funds to pay their employees and/or other
  outstanding obligations such as rent or premiums; and
- Enabling the creation of credit facilities to provide loans and loan guarantees to all
  employers negatively impacted by COVID-19 means they can maintain operations, many of
  which are (or support) critical infrastructure services, and pay their employees.

The Florida Chamber and other organizations across Florida are doing their part, uniting hundreds of thousands of businesses and working with our governor and the state legislature to keep Floridians safe and the economy open. We're counting on you to set aside partisan politics and keep leading. We all stand ready to continue helping Florida businesses to survive this crisis and eventually thrive again.

## III. Key Issues – State Reemployment Tax Rate & Changes

- Minimum Tax Rate: Increasing from 0.10 percent to 0.29 percent
  - In dollars, minimum tax is increasing from \$7 to \$20.30 per employee
- Maximum Tax Rate: Remains at 5.4 percent or \$378 per employee
  - Increase in rate is due to non-charge benefits to individual employers and a need to replenish the trust fund
- 2021 Maximum Number of Weeks: Increasing from 12 weeks to 19 weeks
- Individual notices to employers going out this month








